July 30 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time The rich man was too encumbered with his possessions to follow Jesus (see Mark 10:28-31). He went away sad. Peter, on the other hand, had left everything that got in the way of following Jesus. His boats and nets were still his, but he did not let them get in the way of following and serving Jesus. He used his boat to transport Jesus when it was needed – so too with his nets. They were there if needed. He also kept his house, but it became a place for Jesus to reside and to use as his headquarters.

He still owned or possessed these things, but he used them in such a way that they did not get in his way of serving Jesus and the Kingdom of God. He was detached from them even if he still owned them. We too must consider how we can detach ourselves from our possessions so they will not prevent us from spending our time and energies to serve God and his kingdom. In this way, we will reap supernatural and eternal dividends. Our reward will be exceedingly great!

Unlike the rich man, Peter and the other disciples had left everything to follow Jesus. What about them? Jesus responded that all who have left family and property for the sake of the Gospel will receive a hundredfold more than they left behind –

even in this age: brothers and sisters, mothers and fathers, children and lands. What they left behind in natural, earthly relationships, they will regain on a supernatural, spiritual level. These will be multiplied immeasurably, like the grains of sand on the seashore or the stars in the sky (compare Gen 22:17).



The spiritually rich relationships in the Kingdom of God will be far greater than what was left behind. These rewards will take place in the present age. And besides that, those who follow Jesus in such a wholehearted fashion will be rewarded with the glorious, eternal life in heaven.

At the same time, however, Jesus' disciples can expect to experience various forms of persecution. Those who love this world will be against those who proclaim the Gospel whose doctrine contradicts the beliefs of those who live only for the present age. Jesus' disciples may be last now on a worldly level of thinking and living, but they will be first in the end. Truth will prevail.

Jesus became human so he could make us divine. Through baptism we were joined to his glorified humanity. In this way we are united to God and live by his own eternal life. This eternal life of knowledge and love between the Father and Son in the Spirit completes our natural life and raises it up to the divine level. This is why it is a life particularly joyful. It is a special, unearthly joy which Jesus greatly desired to give us (Jn 15:11).


To maintain this heavenly joy we must remain united to Jesus by living in his love. This we do by keeping his word and doing his will. We may experience this supernatural joy in various degrees, depending on the extent of our purity of heart and love for God. We are called to such a total love for God that we avoid the least sin and any undue self love. Thus the divine love and heavenly happiness (beatitude) can freely flow through our whole persons and exhilarate us with the JOY OF GOD.

There is another factor, besides personal sin and undue attachment to creatures that prevents us from experiencing the JOY OF GOD in its fullness. There will always be that basic joy that comes from our sharing in God's life through sanctifying grace. This happiness of God is experienced at least as peace and tranquility of soul. We are content, knowing that we are one with God, having done his will and been pleasing to him. Our consciences do not blame us. We enjoy the presence of God – at least in some vague way. But our human nature, tinged with original sin and its sinful tendencies, is too coarse to perceive in fullness the JOY OF GOD who is SO NEAR.

The flesh is not conducive to the life of the spirit. Rather, in its unpurified state, it is opposed to it. Moreover, our sins leave a residue of impurity that blunts our spiritual sensitivity. How can we repair the evil effects of sin so that we will become more sensitive to the JOY OF GOD? We need to be more active in seeking God through prayer, sacred reading, and the reception of the sacraments; and we must live more selflessly for him through the practice of self-denial and detachment so that we will become purer and more single-hearted. In this regard, deprivation has an important part to play in our lives. The limitations imposed on us by the

boundaries human existence places upon us attack our selfish ways. Surrendering to God in these circumstances conquers our self-will. Submitting to him by accepting them vanquishes our pride. This is very sanctifying. Moreover, the sufferings involved in human existence, like hurts, losses, ailments and foiled plans purify our sense-bound nature. This refines it and attunes it to spirit-life. It is transformed and deified. Now it can begin to experience God and the fullness of HIS JOY. Such endurance for the love of God likewise increases all the virtues.

But patiently enduring suffering imposed upon us is not the only way to purify our unredeemed human nature which is so impervious to the spiritual and the divine. Patient endurance, which is called for in carrying out our duties, in relating to difficult people, in performing our jobs etc. is also purify ing. There is something about the discipline and intensity of



love required for patient endurance that spiritualizes us. For discipline is the assertion of spirit over matter and the inertia of the flesh. Discipline is indicative of spirit-dominance and thus unites us to God to a greater degree. This is true for us anytime we practice any of the virtues. They are positive ways of living the God-life as we deny our sense-bound self and the vices that accompany selfish living.

#### The Building of a Dynamic Come, Lord Jesus! Church Parish

St. Agnes in Jefferson is a vibrant *Come, Lord Jesus!* community. A *Come, Lord Jesus!* banner is visible on its grounds. A *Come, Lord Jesus!* meeting room has been designated for its members in which you will see a large poster of our 12- Step meeting format and book racks custom-made for Father Bertrand's spiritual booklets. Growth of *Come, Lord Jesus!* is continual and members fervently serve their church. The Church Parish Representatives responsible for this are Luci and Steve Morgan. They humorously refer to themselves as Moses (Luci – who hears God's instructions) and Aaron

(Steve – sent to assist due to his gift of bold and proficient speech).







Their *Come, Lord Jesus!* story began when Luci picked up a brochure on *Come, Lord Jesus!* at a neighboring church. She shared her interest with Steve and they contacted the office. After meeting with the New Orleans *Come, Lord Jesus!* Coordinators and their parish priest, a ministry at St. Agnes began in the Spring of 2017. It didn't take long for their group to grow. "We believed that there were probably others who would want to grow spiritually as well" (Steve).

Since that time, during each Advent and Lenten season, the Morgans' conduct an outreach and lead groups for any parishioners who want a mini experience of *Come, Lord Jesus!*. Since their existing *Come, Lord Jesus!* groups have been well- formed, Steve and Luci assign new leadership and move on to lead the new groups being established. This has proven to be an excellent method of expansion. "Seeing the growth in other members of *Come, Lord Jesus!* is one reason I continue with this wonderful ministry. Members have been open to evangelizing by giving time and energy to other ministries here at St. Agnes, which keeps our parish alive in hope for the future of the church" (Luci). "We grew from two groups to four groups! We now have 7 groups, including one Spanish group. We have four daytime groups and three nighttime groups" (Steve).

"No matter how long you have been involved in *Come, Lord Jesus!*, there will always be people who have just heard God speaking to them and are ready to take the next step along their faith journey. We want to provide that path to better understanding in order to develop a closer relationship with Christ! *Come, Lord Jesus!* is the path we have chosen to help God's children find that relationship." As long as the Holy Spirit guides us, we will continue to make time and be available to help in that journey" (Steve).
