

When Jesus became one of us, he took the form of a servant (Phil 2:5-8).

If we could follow his way of servanthood, we would need to do nothing other than be totally dedicated to those in our care, fulfill the demands, and carry out the duties entailed. Following the way of love in this way requires self-effacement and forgetfulness of self at all times. It calls for true humility - lowliness, sacrifice, and endless generosity. It demands that we give all with still more being asked of us! When we are placed in a situation demanding this supreme kind of love, we are brought face to face with ourselves and made to see just what kind of stuff we are made. This is how the Lord would form us and guide us to true greatness. Ordinarily, however, we are asked to "follow the way of love" freely, without coercion. This is the way that Jesus teaches us by his coming. He became man to show us how to become like God – by following the way of love, by placing ourselves in self-sacrificing love to those we live and work with. We do not have to go far to find opportunities. They are always at hand. Give yourself in love! May the God of love who encompasses you, draw you ever more strongly to "follow the way of love, even as Christ loved you. He gave himself..."



Our goal in the spiritual life is total union with God through the union of our wills with God's will. This is what Jesus instructed us to pray for in the "Our Father": "thy will be done". All good will come from this union of wills. Our will is the faculty which says "yes" to God. It is through the will that we surrender ourselves to God. By this power we command all of the other powers to be submissive to God.

But how can we surrender our will to God when it, like the rest of our body-person is tinged with the effects of original and personal sin? We have learned that we have been wounded by original sin.

The remedy for this woundedness is to go against our disordered self-love. For, the moment we go against this self-love we go toward God who is in the opposite direction. This self-denial requires that we muster our spiritual forces in the form of discipline. Such assertion of spirit disposes us for union with God and puts us in movement toward him. In this selfless act we show God that we love him more than ourselves. This love is transforming in God-likeness – for, "God is love" (1 Jn 4:16). We become love and participate in the divine life of love. This explains why an act of self-denial for love of God propels us towards God. Jesus also explained that love of neighbor is an exercise in divine love whose object is God himself. That is why St. John tells us that, "If we love one another, God dwells in us, and his love is brought to perfection in us" (1 Jn 4:12). Jesus considers as done to himself our acts of charity to others (Mt 25:40).



So, we see the value of going against our will, tinged as it is with disordered self-love. This is its innate tendency. That is why Jesus explained that "whoever wishes to be my follower must deny his very self" (Lk 9:23). God provides many opportunities for us to practice selfless love toward him and our neighbor in that each demands that we go against our own selfish wills to fulfill his needs. Each time we consent, the purity and strength of our love increases. We must therefore be on the lookout for these opportunities to practice love and sacrifice – they are our friends assisting us toward high sanctity. The pure love involved is like the pure love-life in the divinity.

What are these opportunities offered us to love and sacrifice for God? The world he created is limited so that many things fall short of our expectations and needs. They go against our will. We are called to embrace these events, accept them and love God through them, offering them as spiritual sacrifices (see Rom 12: 1; Eph 5:12). We are called to leave ourselves and do God's will through his word, his Church, our superiors, our duties, state of life, family, etc.

What are these opportunities offered us to love and sacrifice for neighbor? These are the endless needs of those with whom we live and work. We must bear with the differences that exist between us because of gender, race, religion, nationality, temperament, etc., that we must endure. We are given many opportunities all day long throughout our life to practice pure love by going against our wills to please God and to love and do good to the people with whom we are in touch.

What a marvelous opportunity to grow spiritually, to become transformed into the very love of God! By continuous prayer, we beg God to turn these occasions to profit by successfully crossing our own selfish wills to do his will as we love, love, love.




